Title: Wilson's Prom.

Artist: Mary Tattersall

Comment: I found the composition complex, incorporating many elements from the environment. She expressed the spirit of the ocean, combining a soft, cohesive colour palette and exploring complex textures in the foliage, rocks and sand, imbuing the composition with a gentle sense of movement.

Comment: Initially we are engaged by the emotion in Billy's eyes – these are the highlight. Further analysis into this drawing reveals a subtle application of colour emerging across the page from left to right. A great deal of subtle manipulation has been required to capture the soft sheen in the dog's fur and create a highlight around the head. This defines the black dog emerging from a dark space. It is a heartfelt response to a trusted companion.

Comment: I love the feel and presence in this artwork. It's success relies on the interaction between light and dark rectangular shapes, integration of irregular line work punctuated by bursts of texture. The interplay between the abstract elements works together and animate the surface tension.

Comment: Honing her innate drawing skills, the artist has presented a highly accomplished head study in graphite pencil.
